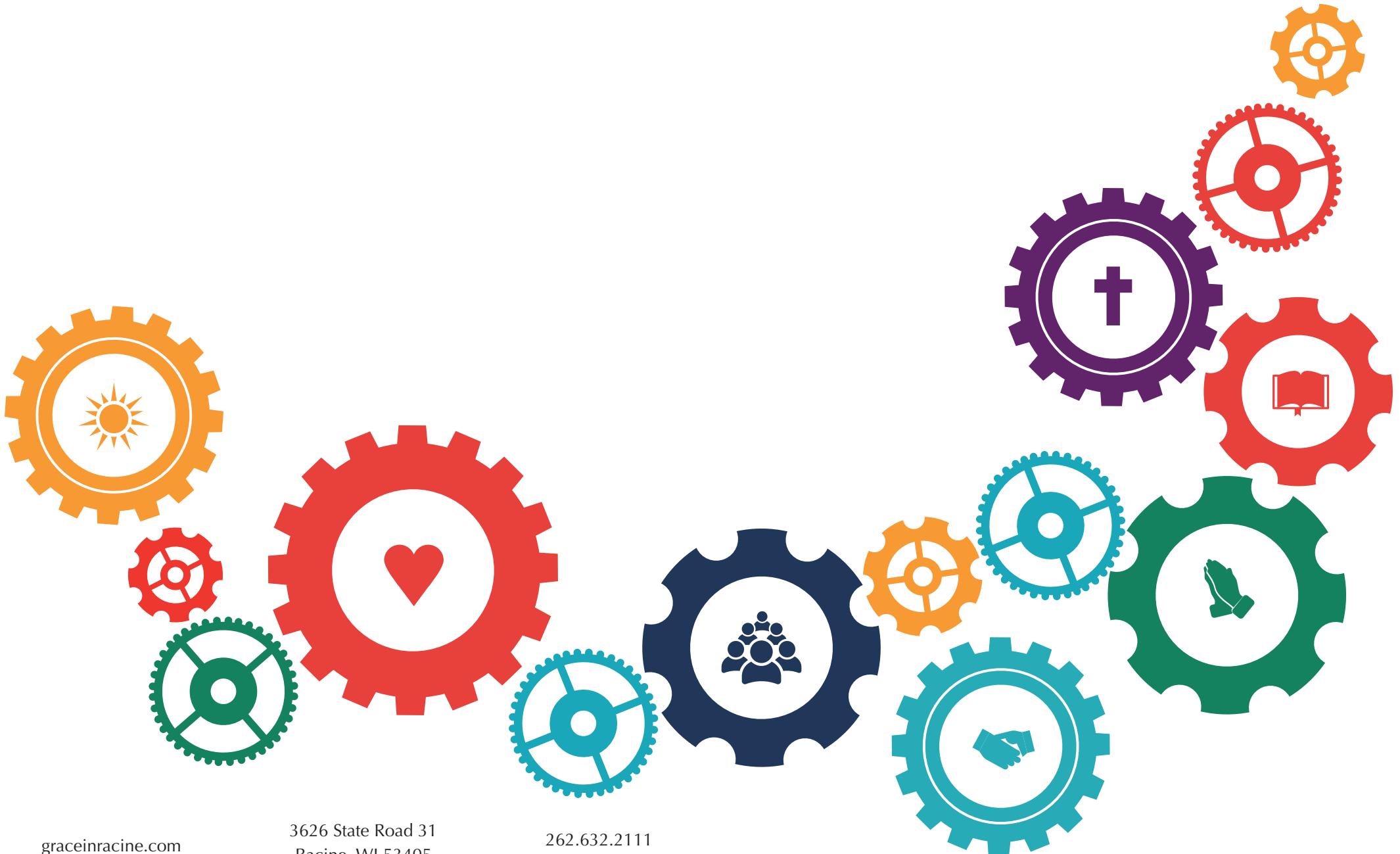

# Sermon Notes

## In-Sermon Focus Questions

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These questions are designed to keep you engaged during the sermon.

1. What does it all mean that Scripture is 'breathed out by God'? Why is this enough of an argument for us to be a Scripture saturated church?
2. When Paul speaks of Scripture being used for reproof and correction, what is he getting at?
3. At the end of the passage, Paul tells us that Scripture is necessary for us to be 'equipped for every good work'. What does this imply about us as a redeemed people?
4. What does being a Scripture saturated church look like in the context of our corporate gathering? In our small groups? In a one to one setting? Individually?

# Sermon Review Discussion Questions

These questions are for *after* the sermon and can be used for Life Group discussion, one-to-one discipleship, or personal reflection and application.

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Most Christians will readily agree that Scripture plays an integral role in the Christian life. It is the very word of God! It is profitable for teaching us truth and correcting falsehood. It provides the necessary instruction for living out our faith on a daily basis. This is why our worship gatherings are saturated with Scripture and why our groups are committed to teaching Scripture. We also benefit from reading Scripture one-to-one and individually. Making this value a reality as individuals will dramatically impact us as a church body.

## Discussion Questions

1. What is your understanding of the phrase, “You are what you eat”? How true do you think this statement is? What might your diet say about you? Why is it so tempting to eat what tastes good rather than eating the nutrients that our bodies really need?
2. Our passage states that Scripture is God’s Word, profitable, and necessary. How do these attributes affect how you see and approach Scripture? What specific challenges keep you from experiencing Scripture in these ways? How can we address those challenges?
3. Where do you see Scripture saturating our worship services? How does its presence deepen and enrich your understanding of Scripture? How does it strengthen your trust of the Bible? Why is expositional preaching important for any Christian’s regular diet?
4. How has discussing Scripture in groups (Bible studies, Life Groups, classes, etc) helped you grow in dependence on Scripture? What are some benefits that you experience from reading Scripture with others that you don’t experience reading by yourself?
5. Read [Matt. 4:4](#). How does dependence upon Scripture ultimately reflect dependence upon God? What tangible steps can we take to grow our belief in the necessity of God’s word? How can we make our time spent in Scripture more spiritually profitable?

# Next Week’s Sermon Preparation

These questions are for personal use during the week to help you prepare for next week’s passage, [John 5:18-47](#).

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## Context

1. What has happened so far in the narrative? Have there been any major events, characters, or themes?
2. What has happened just prior to the section you are reading?

## Observation

1. What do you learn about the main characters in this section? How does the author describe them? How do they describe themselves?
2. Is time or place significant in the events that happen in the passage?
3. Is there a conflict or high point in the passage?
4. Do you think there is a main point or theme in this section of the story?
5. What surprises are there?

## Meaning

1. Are there any ‘editorial’ comments from the author about the events in the narrative? How do these comments illuminate what is happening?
2. Does someone in the narrative learn something or grow in some way? How? What does this person learn?
3. What does the passage reveal about who Jesus is, and what he came into the world to do?
4. How could you sum up the meaning of this passage in your own words?

## Application

1. How does this passage challenge (or confirm) your understanding?
2. Is there some attitude you need to change?
3. What does this passage teach you about being a disciple of Jesus?
